

## **Hartwell Primary School PE & Sports Premium Strategy 2018-19**

### **Purpose of the Premium**

PE and Sport Premium is an initiative that aims to help increase and improve the PE and sporting opportunities for children. It was first provided in the 2013/14 academic year and the current government has pledged to continue this funding until 2020.

PE and Sport Premium funding is provided jointly by the Department for Education, the Department for Health and Culture and the Department for Media and Sport. It has been allocated to primary school headteachers and is ring-fenced, meaning that it can only be spent on the provision of PE and sport in schools.

The Government believes that headteachers and school leaders should decide how to use the funding for PE and Sports in school. They are held accountable for the decisions they make through:

- The performance outcomes of all pupils compared with their peers
- The Ofsted inspection framework, under which inspectors focus on the attainment of pupil groups, in particular in those areas where specific funding has been provided
- The reports that schools are required to publish online for Parents.

### **How can schools use the Premium?**

The premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

The Secretary of State does not consider the following expenditure as falling within the scope of additional or sustainable improvement:

- Employing coaches or specialist teachers to cover the planning, preparation and assessment (PPA) arrangements – these should come out of the school's core staffing budget
- Teaching the minimum requirements of the existing PE curriculum

### **Overview of Hartwell Primary School's strategies for improving pupils' PE and sport participations and attainment and giving pupils the opportunity to develop a healthy, active lifestyle.**

We spend our PE and sports funding in the following ways to improve PE and sport participation and to enable pupils to develop a healthy, active lifestyle:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles.

2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.

3. Increase confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and Sport.

4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.

5. Increase participation in competitive sport.

Our rationale for spending money in this way is: “ALL pupils leaving primary school to be physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.”

The DfE Vision “Physical Literacy can be described as the motivation, confidence, physical competence, knowledge and understanding that provides children with the movement foundation for lifelong participation in physical activity. Enabling them to be physically literate supports their development as competent, confident and healthy movers.”

Primary school Physical Literacy Framework, developed by Youth Sport Trust, Sport England, County Sports Partnership Network, Association of Physical Education and Sports Coach UK.

How the improvements made will be sustainable in the future:

- Increased knowledge and skills of staff members
- Strong links formed with local community clubs
- Strong links establish with local Primary and Secondary Schools
